ABOUT THE AUTHOR: just a short paragraph of writing accomplishments

My story appeals to the concrete operational and formal operational stage as it merges symbolic notions of thinking and language with a more complex understanding of ideas of neuro-diversity and how one can appreciate their true selves. For example, within this story, the character's synesthesia results in one specific object or sense to result in the addition of another completely opposite sense. Therefore, establishing the idea of our basic five senses correlates to the idea of concreate operational stage as children are learning about the specific characteristics that specific objects posses in this case, it being the five senses.

Additionally, by stating that one sense results to another further develops on how complex the human mind can really be. This ultimately relates to the formal operational stage as it begins to introduce more complex ideas that humans obtain. This therefore adds to children's more logical and complex thought process into certain situations. As my book deals with both the concrete operational and formal operational stages, I took inspiration from the book "We're Going on a Bear Hunt" by Helen Oxenbury. Within her text, Oxenbury describes the sounds and feelings of specific everyday objects such as rain and grass while avoiding sensory objects and images within the book. By doing so, I was able to take inspiration and create a book that included the senses without physical representation of them.
